	<p>Additional information:</p> <p>The classes are similar to seminars.</p> <p>The participants work on a larger text as a whole (a selected extensive piece of writing) or on smaller fragments of text that illustrate a literary, cultural or historical issue.</p> <p>Thus, the students, on the one hand, consolidate, expand and systematize lexical and grammatical knowledge and improve their translation skills from Latin into Polish. On the other hand, the students learn to pose and solve research problems (with a greater degree of difficulty and a wider scope than in the Latin translation course).</p> <p>Greek or Neo-Latin texts may be used as supplementary material.</p>

Subject contents	The selection of translated and interpreted texts and topics depends each year on the decision of the instructor and on the revealed interests of students. The subject of reading may be, for example, one book of a poem by Lucan. On its basis, the following issues can be developed: structural and stylistic features of this original epic, portraits of heroes, the image of the civil war in Lucan and other historical, Greek and Roman sources; an imitation of Lucan's poem by authors of later eras.
