Basic concepts and event-type classification: criteria and consequences (mass event, assembly, special occupation of the road lane), including the specifics of events held on public roads. 2. The legal framework in Poland for the organisation and safety of sports events (in particular the Act on the Safety of Mass Events and the Act on Sport) and the organisers basic obligations. 3. Regulations of sports governing bodies: selected Polish sports associations and international federations; the relationship between internal regulations and generally applicable law. 4. The organisational model for large sports events: structure of roles and responsibilities, risk and incident management, and coordination across the cycle of preparation/delivery/evaluation/settlement. 5. Formal requirements and documentation: applications, procedures, rules and regulations, instructions, security plans, contracts; preparation of documentation for a mass event. 6. Permits and institutional cooperation: procedures for obtaining decisions/approvals and practical principles of cooperation between the organiser and public administration authorities, local government, and security and emergency services (good practices). 7. Preparation of space and infrastructure: safety of events in buildings, at venues and in open areas; preparation of the city's public space; logistics and zone planning. 8. Event participants and the organisers obligations: the legal status of spectators, athletes and staff, their basic rights and duties, as well as the organisers obligations towards participants, services and public authorities. 9. Safety measures and technical solutions: access control, monitoring, participant identification, crowd-control measures, response procedures; systems supporting event planning and management (software and technical solutions). 10. Ethical standards and liability: inclusivity and accessibility, non-discrimination, dilemmas (e.g., safety vs privacy), and the basics of criminal, misdemeanour and administrative liability for breaches.
