Staged forms and phenomenal forms of committing a criminal act. Exclusion of criminal responsibility. Counter-acts. Guilt and exclusion of guilt. Social harm and its gradation. Confluence of offenses and provisions of the law. Demonstration of the problems of application of the principles of criminal responsibility with examples of selected types of crimes and infractions.
