Subject contents	The problematic aspects in 3 Semester - grammar: adverbs and prepositions; comparison of adjectives and adverbs; subjunctive and imperative mood of verbs; participles (adjectival and adverbial); syntax of simple and complex sentences; imperative sentences. Both oral and written expressions (dialogue, description, narrative) are practiced. Basic rules of spelling are reviewed. Thematic vocabulary is introduced, such as ways of spending free time, illness, holidays, traditions, and customs in Ukraine. Additional literary texts adapted to thematic contexts include Ukrainian folk tales and Ukrainian songs. Continuous engagement with Ukrainian current affairs through reading contemporary texts and watching television programs, as well as familiarization with Ukrainian tradition and culture, is emphasized.
