Morphology and word formation: inflection and derivation, the concept of morpheme, selected word-forming affixes in the English language, selected word formation processes. 4. Syntax: classes, categories, and grammatical functions in traditional grammar, examples of syntactic (tree) diagrams and transformations in generative grammar. 5. Semantics: the difference between sense and meaning, the concept of lexeme, lexical relations. 6. Pragmatics: context, conversational maxims, speech acts, deictic expressions. 7. Sociolinguistics: the basics of the relationship between language and language user communities, illustrated by the example of the English language and/or others. 8. Genetic classification of the languages of Europe: Indo-European and others.
