Subject contents	Component: integrated skills course Lexical ranges corresponding to level C1. The issues discussed serve to consolidate and improve lexicographic content specified for this level. Vocabulary occurring in texts discussed during classes and/or extra-textual vocabulary, grouped into lexical sets for the purposes of discussing a given topic. Lexicon work, based on authentic or minimally adapted texts, including defining, analyzing and exemplification of vocabulary, as well as its practical use, both in separate contexts and in semantic relations (synonyms, antonyms, polysemy, collocations, idioms and expressions). Productive practice of lexical skills in closed lexical tasks (lexical sets, word formation). Developing listening comprehension skills, based on authentic materials and advanced textbook materials at level C1/C2. Global understanding skills and understanding selected content aspects such as the main topic and subtopics, the speaker's opinion and attitude to the presented content, directly communicated and implied content. Practicing the formula of open questions using summary and paraphrase as well as closed questions (multiple choice questions, gap filling in summary sentences) in a discussion of the text. Work on improving the ability to understand written texts, at level C1/C2, such as an essay, a journalistic article, a personalized text, a biography, a book fragment, both in its global dimension (reading for gist), as well as understanding more detailed contents including the function of the text, the writer's opinion on the presented content, directly communicated and implied meanings, social and/or cultural context. Deducing the meanings of words from the context and paraphrasing them. Deepening knowledge of textual discourse through analysis and synthesis of elements of textual organization (exemplification, comparison, reference), its coherence and cohesion, in tasks requiring textual reconstruction (cloze texts) and containing hints (grammatical and lexical cues). Developing speaking skills in the scope of interactive and group competences (initiating interactions, exchanging information and views, expressing opinions) as well as monologue skills (summarizing and summarizing the content being discussed, one's own and other interlocutors' opinions, presenting justification for one's own opinions). Monitoring pronunciation, both at the segmental and suprasegmental level. Component: academic grammar The aim of the course in the first semester is to work on understanding the syntactic specificity of academic texts in English and avoiding typical errors in the use of grammatical structures for expressing real and unreal tenses and their skillful correction. In addition, the course develops aspects of grammar that are important in academic texts, in particular expanding knowledge about the use of modal verbs that allow for the formulation of hypotheses and the use of conditionals in written academic texts as well as hedging. During the course, students perform analytical tasks, solve problems and work on the correctness of their own texts and correct sample works provided by the instructor. The course is based on teaching materials at C1/C2 level and other authentic academic texts. Component: academic writing The language of academic texts: distinguishing between everyday and scientific language, working on stylistic correctness. Proofreading. Structure of an academic text - coherence within the text, conjunctions and discourse markers, punctuation. Using university databases and Internet sources; learning how to create a bibliography, mark the sources of texts, create footnotes and endnotes; defining the concept of plagiarism; introducing ways of citing text sources in written work, paraphrasing and summarising longer text fragments; analysing, estimating and evaluating data; distinguishing between facts and opinions; learning to recognise discrepancies in the data available; becoming familiar with patterns of correct reasoning and expressing thoughts in sentences (sentence logic); recognising important interdependencies in the text; presenting and discussing various functions of discourse.		
Prerequisites and co-requisites	Knowledge of English at C1 level. Additional requirement: the condition for passing the entire Practical English I Module is to obtain positive grades for all its components. Obtaining a negative grade for even one of the components results in a negative grade for the entire subject. The student is obliged to attend classes according to the UG regulations.
