Subject contents	Class topics: The teacher each time decides on the scope and order of implementation of the program content, including: architecture, polychrome, ceramics and sculpture of selected cities of ancient Greece: Knossos - the palace of King Minos; Mycenae the seat of the Achaean rulers; Athens - the cradle of democracy (Acropolis, agora, theater of Dionysus, Roman agora, Odeon of Herodes Atticus); Olympia city of games; Corinth - the city of potters, Epidaurus - the city of healings and theater; Delphi - the oracle of Apollo; Cyprus Aphrodite's island; Delos, Samos, Rhodes, Kos islands of the Aegean Sea; Asia Minor Miletus, Ephesus, Halicarnassus; Pergamon a Hellenistic gem; Magna Graecia Paestum, Syracuse; Alexandria the city of the Ptolemies; collections of Greek art in the largest museums in the world - the British Museum in London, the Louvre in Paris, the National Archaeological Museum in Athens, the Acropolis Museum in Athens, the National Archaeological Museum in Heraklion, the Pergamon Museum in Berlin, the Vatican Museums in Rome, the National Museum in Warsaw. Discussion of selected issues will allow students to better understand the history of Greek art in the historical and cultural context and its influence on the art of later centuries.
