Subject contents	The range of material for students at B1 language proficiency level covers vocabulary from subject areas: 1. People (personal details, physical appearance, clothing, character traits, feelings and emotions, tastes); 2. Family (family members, family size, history, relatives, family relationships, celebrations); 3. Everyday life (daily routines, times of day, everyday objects, social life); 3. Leisure activities (hobbies, hobbies, leisure activities, relaxation); 5. Sports (basic sports, basic sports equipment, sports events); 6. Housing (type, location and size of flat/house, types of rooms, furnishing and renting a flat/house); 7. Places (type, location, size of locality, public institutions, types of buildings, spatial plan, town vs. country, urban buildings); 8. Travel and transport (means of transport, accommodation, travel agencies, excursions, types of luggage, documents necessary for travel, tourist attractions); 9. Work (place of work, names of occupations, types of work, wages and salaries, labour market, labour law); 10. Education (education system, types of schools, fields of study, life and problems of school, names of school subjects, extracurricular life, names of school equipment, grades, examinations, tests); 11. Food (food, meals, dishes, drinks, table settings, kitchen utensils, food preparation, recipes, eating places); 12. Shopping and services (types of shops, goods, information, promotion, advertising, measures, weights, sizes, workshops and service outlets, ways of paying); 13. Health and personal hygiene (well-being, body parts, health conditions, illnesses, visiting the doctor, pharmacy, diet and healthy lifestyles, accidents); 14. Environment (climate, seasons, weather, landscapes, plant and animal world, nature conservation); 15. State and society (organisation of the state, state ceremonies, political and economic situation, Polish political parties, living conditions, crime); 16. Science and technology (development of technology, computerisation, discoveries and inventions); 17. Media (press, radio, television, Internet); 18. Culture (fields of culture, cultural events, participation in culture, prominent artists of culture); 19 Other topics of interest to learners (current news, political and social events, living conditions, living standards, stereotypes). In terms of grammatical-syntactic issues, it is envisaged that: 1. issues of name inflection: the category of genus and number of nouns and adjectives, the conjugation of nouns by cases in the singular plural and the mechanisms of noun conjugation (repetition and consolidation), the conjugation of pronouns and adjectives by cases in the singular and plural, the conjugation of numerals by cases and the functions of cases (repetition and consolidation). From the issues of verb inflection: semantic and grammatical features of verbs (repetition and consolidation), conjugation (consolidation), active and reflexive side, modes, impersonal forms, verbs of movement.
