Subject contents	Lecture topics: Introduction to the subject. Historical survey of the Serbian language from the Middle Ages to the adoption of the Vuka reform. Overview of dialects of the Serbian language. Phonetics: division of sounds, dividing words into sounds, consonant similarity (in terms of sonority and place of articulation), simplification of consonant groups, vowel alternations, consonant alternations, palatalization. Morphology: introduction, noun: types, types of derivation, inflection patterns, inflection irregularities, adjective: division, simple and complex forms, inflection patterns, grading of adjectives, numerals: division, inflection, pronouns: personal, possessive, personal, possessive, demonstrative, interrogatives, etc. - conjugation, irregularities, verb: determining the subject of the verb (infinitive and present tense), types of conjugation, conjugation of auxiliary verbs, regular verbs, present tense, imperative mood, aorist, past imperfective tense, perfect tense past tense, subjunctive mood, forms passive voice, impersonal forms, participles, infinitive, future tense I and II, indeclinable parts of speech, adverbs: division and gradation, prepositions, conjunctions and particles. Word formation. Syntax: single declarative sentences: subject, predicate, adjectives, complements and adverbials, negative sentences, interrogative sentences, command, wish, prohibition, complex sentences: structure, types of subordinate and coordinate sentences, word order in a sentence. Serbian punctuation and spelling.
