Subject objectives	The aim of the classes is to get acquainted with the outline of the history of Icelandic literature and to improve the ability to analyze and interpret literary works. Particular emphasis is placed on phenomena occurring in Icelandic literature since the second quarter of the 19th century, as well as the key concepts such as the national perspective and the related attitude to medieval history and tradition. During the course, literary works will be discussed in a cultural and historical context, taking into account their current significance in Icelandic culture.

Subject contents	Literature of the Enlightenment (Mágnus Stephensen, Sigurður Pétursson) and the beginnings of Romanticism (Sveinbjörn Egilsson) Selected phenomena in 19th century literature: literature of the Romantic period: (Jónas Hallgrímsson, Matthías Jochumsson, Jón Thoroddsen) and its importance for the development of national identity, folk fairy tales; the presence of motifs and forms of folk art (rímur, short satirical poems) in the literature of the first half 19th century (Sigurður Breiðfjörð, Hjálmar Jónsson, Benedikt Sveinbjarnarson Gröndal); literature of the realism period: Gestur Pálsson, neo-romanticism Selected phenomena and figures in 20th century literature - Halldór Kiljan Laxness; development of poetry (Einar Bragi); multilingual literature (Danish and Norwegian); modernist breakthrough ("Birtingur" magazine); Thor Vilhjálmsson - a break with the traditional novel, the presence of a national perspective in Icelandic literature; anti-urbanism: city (Reykjavik) vs. countryside issues.
