Translatability of literary styles and particular tropes. Literal translation and functional translation working with text. The problem of untranslatability based on selected texts. Types of interpreting (consecutive, simultaneous). Translator's workshop - dictionaries, lexicons, encyclopedias, professional literature. Working conditions of a translator. Rules for using translator services.
