Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to reinforce the knowledge acquired during previous semesters of learning Danish and to provide structured knowledge of Danish language covering grammatical and lexical aspects at the A2+/B1 level. These will be conveyed in the appropriate order according to increasing difficulty. The main purpose of exercises in the third semester of the second year of studies is: a/ to expand Danish vocabulary; b/ to demonstrate the characteristics of informal and formal styles in oral and written expressions; and c/ to consolidate the grammar rules of the Danish language.
