Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to familiarise students with the history, theory and aesthetics of concrete architecture, with particular emphasis on modernism and brutalism in the European and Polish context. Students will learn about selected buildings and architectural ideas, and will attempt to analyse and reinterpret these phenomena in a contemporary context. Less obvious forms will also be presented, such as small architecture, outdoor sculpture and monuments made of concrete and reinforced concrete. Particular attention will be paid to the reception of these objects from admiration for modernism, through controversies surrounding brutalism, to processes of revitalisation, demolition and grassroots activities for the protection of post-war heritage. The classes combine lectures, discussions, analysis exercises, work with source texts and field trips around Gdańsk and Gdynia, enabling direct contact with the objects discussed. During the classes, students develop their skills in formal analysis and interpretation and become more sensitive to changes in the evaluation of 20th-century architecture.
