Subject objectives	The main objective of the course is to deepen students' knowledge of the spiritual and material culture, literature, and religion of medieval Northern Europe, with a particular focus on the daily life and rituals of medieval Scandinavian and Icelandic society. The course also aims to enrich students' reading of medieval Icelandic literature through a contextual approach, highlighting the relationships between Old Norse literature and the social and material reality of medieval Scandinavia and Iceland.

Accounts from Icelandic sagas, skaldic poetry, and the <i>Poetic Edda</i> on death and funerals in the context of archaeological findings. • The significance of grave goods, ritual gestures, and behaviors in the context of Norse mythology. Cosmology and eschatology in Norse mythology. • Concepts of the body, soul, and afterlife in Old Norse beliefs. <i>Draugr</i> the restless dead and methods to prevent their return (atypical burials, vampire graves, apotropaic rituals). • Commemorating the dead skaldic mourning poetry (<i>erfíkvæði</i>). The cult of the dead as a source of Old Norse religion. • Rituals limiting arbitrary acts of violence: the honor duel (<i>hólmganga</i>). The amorality of Old Norse deities, the concept of fate, and divine judgment. • Blood feud (<i>hefnd</i>), customs, and legal regulations related to homicide and murder. The gods Höðr and Loki and the killing of Baldr. Baldr as a "scapegoat" (René Girard). Human sacrifice in Old Norse religion. • Social exclusion greater and lesser banishment, social stigmas (<i>níð</i>, <i>ergi</i>), the <i>níðstang</i> (pole of shame). Loki and Odin as figures of social norm transgression. Loki as a trickster figure. • Creating interpersonal bonds: sworn brotherhood (<i>fóstrbræðralag</i>), foster fatherhood, marriage, and divorce. Family relations among the Old Norse gods (Æsir and Vanir). • Rituals related to childbirth. Infanticide. • Viking games and pastimes. <i>Hnefatafl</i> the strategic board game of medieval Scandinavians. • The annual rhythm of life in medieval Scandinavia: the calendar and religious festivals of Old Norse religion
