Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to reflect together on selected issuesof the problems of modern Slavic national identities: the processes of their formation, theoretical sources of their discourses, their practical and social side, historical contexts, their significance in the process of understanding contemporary cultural, social and political phenomena in Europe and the world. The basic aim of the course is to enable participants to move freely on the ethnic map of modern and contemporary Slavdom, with the possibility of understanding the factors influencing its historical shape and contemporary image. A broad approach to identity is undertaken: as a specific type of social practice that can be studied both diachronically and synchronically, related to the meanings of specific cultural contents (identity programs, literary texts, folklore, other areas of symbolic culture), will allow for including in the scope of reflection also those areas that classically remain outside the horizon of cultural anthropology (literature, lexis), and whose analysis through the prism of its methods can be an important cognitive activity. Therefore, it is important to analyse a specific amount of subject knowledge (content) and above all to problematise it from the perspective of anthropological theory (R. Wagner, F. Barth, B. Jovanović, M. Sahlins).

Subject contents	The topics of the course are divided into five parts, which together form the whole subject. The first part will be devoted to issues and problems of studying identity as a social phenomenon within the framework created by cultural anthropology. The second part will analyze the historical conditions of shaping the Slavs' ideas about themselves as a community from the early Middle Ages to the turn of the 18th and 19th centuries, focusing in particular on the typologies of Slavia latina - Slavia orthodoxa (R. Picchio, S. Graciotti) and the "tripartite" sources of Slavic folk culture understood as an autonomous creation (N.I. Tolstoy, B. Jovanović). The third part will problematize modern national programs that gave rise to modern forms of Slavic identity. The programs and visions of the nation created at that time and their social impact in various areas of Slavic societies will be discussed. We will focus in particular on Polish, Ukrainian, Russian and Serbian identity programs, the impact of which will prove to be particularly strong to this day. The fourth part will be devoted to contemporary identity phenomena in the Slavic area: problems of post-Soviet identity in Russia and new ideas of Russian imperialism, the identity conflict of Belarusians and its impact on the current political situation in this country, conflicts in the former Yugoslavia, and the issue of the identity of Russian-speaking areas of Ukraine.

Example issues/ example questions/ tasks being completed	The course is passed on the basis of: a) attendance at classes; b) active participation in classes (reading assigned texts, participating in discussions); c) project and presentation for the credit. The form of credit is a presentation prepared in groups of 2-3 people, which will be a summary of the research project carried out within the scope of the classes. Possible projects will be based on ethnographic field research among Slavic minorities in Poland (Ukrainians, Belarusians, Russians, Serbs - contacts at the instructor's disposal), as well as analysis of specific materials, in each case using a problem-based method based on anthropological theory. Example topics of credit projects: - Ambiguity of the concept of Slaviness in modern Polish identity programs; - Transformations of the content of folk culture in modern and contemporary Slavic identity practices; - Identity and practices of Slavic minorities in Poland (Ukrainians, Belarusians, Russians, Serbs); - The image of Poland and Poles in the discourses and practices of Slavic minorities in Poland (Ukrainians, Belarusians, Russians, Serbs); - New identities of Slavism after the fall of the communist bloc; - Slava latina / Slavia orthodoxa and the category of foreignness in anthropological theory: sources and contemporary state based on research; - To Europe yes, but... Oriental Slavism as a part of Western European identity in the face of the vision of Europe (Western) in Slavic identities; - The issue of Pan-Slavism, its sources, impact in the history of Slavic nations, contemporary presence; - Is Slavic messianism still alive?
