Subject objectives	An objective of the lecture is to introduce the student into the issue of the goddess of war and sexuality Inana/Ištar. Its spatial scope includes mainly the area of Mesopotamian plain. The chronological framework of this lecture, which covers the IVth -Ist millennium B.C. presents a broad scope due to multiple hypostases of the analyzed goddess. The intriguing nature of the goddess and her patronage over the human sexuality makes her a controversial figure even for the modern spectators.
