Subject objectives	The aim of the course is to provide students with in-depth and interdisciplinary knowledge of the relationship between the use of operational and reconnaissance activities and the constitutionally guaranteed right of the individual to a fair trial. Participants will acquire the knowledge necessary to identify, understand, and critically assess not only the operational activities themselves, but also their procedural consequences and impact on the administration of justice. As part of the course, the legal foundations for conducting operational and reconnaissance activities under Polish law will be discussed in particular the provisions of the Police Act, the Internal Security Agency Act, and the Central Anti-Corruption Bureau Act. In addition, regulations contained in the Code of Criminal Procedure, the Penal Code, and relevant executive acts will be addressed. The course also introduces students to case law from national and international courts, including the European Court of Human Rights, which highlights the problems arising from exceeding the limits of legality by authorities conducting operational activities. Students will also become familiar with the positions of legal scholars, oversight institutions (e.g., the Ombudsman, the Supreme Audit Office), and selected reports from non-governmental organizations monitoring abuses of power. Students will be equipped with tools to assess whether operational measures are not only formally lawful, but also consistent with the principles of proportionality, necessity, and minimal interference with civil rights.
