Students learn about the most important differences between such a language and a language understood as a system based on formal logic, i.e. operating with symbols with an unchanging conventional meaning and governed by rules of an algorithmic nature.

Subject contents	Theories of Lexical Meaning: Conceptualism Categories of the world versus categories of the mind and language: epistemological theories and their influence on the understanding of the object of inquiry. Real categories versus mental and nominal categories. The objective category model as the basis for an overly simplified and incomplete view of natural language and its functions. Recent anthropological and psychological findings concerning the influence of the human factor on cognition: the model of natural categories based on <i>family resemblance</i>, as well as the phenomena of prototypes and the basic level of categorization. The construal of the world by the mind: language as a means of recording and conventionalizing experience through its structures – selected conceptualizations. Signs representing modes of construal: indexical signs (including deictic signs), iconic signs, and arbitrary signs. Lexical and grammatical signs (constructions). The conceptualist theory of linguistic meaning. Cognitive strategies: understanding the world through metaphor and metonymy; linguistic evidence for these processes. Mental spaces and conceptual blending. Lexicology from a Cognitive Perspective Symbolic units: idealized cognitive models as conceptual structures constituting the semantic content of lexical items. Metaphor, metonymy Polysemy in cognitive linguistics: prototype meaning, elaborations, and metaphorical extensions. Syntax Formal categories (parts of speech) and their conceptual motivation. Grammatical constructions as symbolic units; the concepts of figure and ground. Context and Meaning Context and its various dimensions (physical, linguistic, and mental) as an indispensable factor determining the meaning of utterances in natural language. Context as a co-determining factor of meaning: implication/inference in linguistic communication.		
Prerequisites and co-requisites	Choosing Natural Language Processing - NLP as the specialisation Additional requirements: The student receives credit based on obtaining a positive exam result: The written exam after completing the course includes cross-sectional questions regarding the discussed theory and practical tasks consisting in explaining selected linguistic issues based on the conceptual apparatus of cognitive linguistics.
