Subject contents	<p>The course will present the diversity of methodological perspectives in the study of prose with a particular focus on narratology. Topics may include the following: Narratology in historical perspective. Subject and fields of narratological research. Levels of communication in narrative text. Typologies of narrative situations [Franz Stanzel]. Structuralist narratology of Gerard Genette: the issue of focalization and so-called omniscience. Temporal organization of narrative texts Typology of narrators according to Gerard Genette Variety of discursive structures. Techniques of presenting the words/thoughts of characters. Elements of the presented world. The concept of the world model. Chronotope. Space as a modeling system. Concept of boundary and mother space. Bakhtin's concept of the novel. The exemplary analysis of narrative texts should show the practical value of theoretical-literary concepts in the study of literary concrete.</p>
