Subject objectives	<p>The aim of the course is to familiarise students with the development and evolution of collecting and museum collections in the German-speaking areas. The lectures discuss in historical order the most important types of collections, the genesis of their origin, the principles that guided the building of collections and the organisation of exhibitions as well as their functions, from medieval treasuries to the renaissance collections of the Wittelsbachs in Munich, characteristic of the 2nd half of the 16th and 17th centuries. Kunstkammern combining art collections with natural history and so-called mirabilia (Rudolf II Habsburg's in Prague, Ferdinand II Habsburg's at Ambras Castle near Innsbruck), 17th- and 18th-century monarchical art collections in Munich, Dresden, Berlin 19th-century public museums of Berlin, Munich, Dresden, Frankfurt am Main to large contemporary museums and galleries. The evolution of German collections is shown against a broad pan-European and, from the mid-19th century onwards, North American background. The class emphasises the enormous role played by the German-speaking countries in the history of collecting and museology. The lecture concludes with a credit, for which the student is required to have knowledge of the material presented in the lectures and the readings.</p>
