Subject objectives	The classes are similar to seminar classes; students work either on the larger entire Greek text (on a selected quite extensive work), or on smaller fragments of various texts that in total illustrate some literary, cultural or historical issue; on the one hand, they consolidate, expand and systematize lexical and grammatical knowledge and improve their translation skills from Greek into Polish, and on the other hand, they learn how to pose and solve research problems (with a greater degree of difficulty and a wider scope than in the Greek translation course).

Subject contents	Topics of the seminar:The selection of translated and interpreted texts and topics depends on the decision of the instructor and the revealed interests of students (for example: the subject of reading may be fragments of works by various Greek historians and on their basis, developing the issue of the development of Greek historiography - the way of understanding history changing over time, the approach to historical sources , influence of philosophical schools, diversity of genres of historical writing, issues of language and style).
