The aim of of the course is both to provide some cultural studies knowledge and to develop a cultural competence, to widen the horizons, and to assimilate certain philosophical concepts, to attain basic orientation in philosophical concepts and texts and the ability to respond to theses put forward by philosophers.

Subject contents	Before discussing German philosophical thought, there will be a brief (2 hour lecture) introduction to the foundations of Western philosophy (ancient philosophy): Presocratics (Tales of Miletus, Pythagoras, Heraclitus) and Eleates (Parmenides, Zeno, Empedocles, Democritus); Sophists (Protagoras), Classics (Socrates, Plato, Aristotle). Relevant content: learning about selected assumptions of modern rationalist philosophers: Descartes and G. W. Leibniz, A. G. Baumgarten, German idealism; I. Kant, J. G Fichte, G.W.F. Hegel; F.W.J. Schelling; the aesthetics and anthropology of F. Schiller, the metaphysics of A. Schopenhauer; German philosophy of life: F. Nietzsche, W. Dilthey; psychoanalysis: S. Freud; C. G. Jung; German existentialism: K. Jaspers, M. Heidegger. Their relevance to the cultural heritage of Europe.
